The Baptism of the Lord

... Immediately after coming out of the water, the Spirit descends upon him in the form of a dove. Now another sacrament is instituted by Christ, the sacrament of Confirmation or, as the Eastern churches call it, *Chrismation*....

Notice that as the Spirit descends upon Jesus, the Father announces from heaven that this is His beloved Son. Here we have a majestic revelation of the Most Holy Trinity, one God in three persons. Then notice that Peter, speaking of this event in Acts 10:37, calls it Jesus' "anointing."

Some wonder why we need the sacrament of Confirmation. To some it appears to be an afterthought, as anticlimactic. After all, we receive the Spirit in baptism and receive Christ bodily in the Eucharist. So what else do we get when we are confirmed?

Simple. We receive our mission and the power to carry it out. For being a "Christian" is not about just "getting saved." It's about sharing in Christ's anointing to transform the world. The mission is an essential part of the package, not an option.

That's why we are called "Christians" or anointed ones. It is not just priests and religious who are supposed to make it happen. Every single one of us is called and anointed. And that's why confirmation is one of the essential sacraments of initiation. Without it, one is not fully incorporated into the Church, which is a missionary community.

The question for those of us who have received this power-packed sacrament is this–what are we doing with it?

SERVANT OF GOD, ELIZABETH PROUT

Most people who drive by the entrance to The Prout School don't know where the school's name comes from. Elizabeth Prout was a nineteenth-century convert to the Catholic faith. Having been raised an Anglican, she was received into the Church by Blessed Dominic



Barbieri, who also received John Henry Newman (now Blessed) into the Catholic faith. She was the "Mother Teresa" of her own day. She exemplified a great love for the poor, and strove to provide adequate education for young people. Elizabeth Prout took vows and became Mother Mary Joseph, gathering like-minded women together with a special devotion to the Passion of Jesus. This community would eventually become the Sisters of the Cross and Passion, who ministered in our parish community and founded The Prout School here in Wakefield. The 151st anniversary of the death of Elizabeth Prout is commemorated today, January 11th. Her cause for canonization has been opened, permitting use of the title, "Servant of God." Please remember the Sisters of the Cross and Passion—the spiritual daughters of Elizabeth Prout-in your prayers throughout the week.

Challenge someone to hear the call ... When was the last time you prayed for an increase of vocations from our own parish community? At the present time, we have several women-religious either from or connected to our parish (some are Sisters of the Cross and Passion, some are Sisters of Divine Providence, and one is a Capuchin Sister of Nazareth). We are blessed to be one of the parishes in a diocese of 150 churches which has two seminarians: Stephen Battey, who is studying at Boston's St. John Seminary and Dan Mahoney who is currently enrolled in his first year of studies at Our Lady of Providence Seminary. When was the last time you encouraged a young man or woman to consider sacrificing their own plans and ambitions to serve Christ and his Church in a special way? When was the last time you asked God what his plan is for you? Vocations do not happen by accident. They are the result of communities of faith that foster and encourage young people to lay down their lives for Christ. Take a moment to encourage our religious sisters and our candidates for Holy Orders. And challenge someone to hear the call. A vocation is not so much about figuring out some mystery, as it is willingness to accept the challenge of the Lord to follow him! The harvest is great; but the laborers are few!

Listening to God's Word

At this morning's 10AM Mass we welcome our First Communion students who will reflect during the homily on the importance of listening to God's Word in Holy Scripture. The Church teaches that before Christ can be received in the Eucharist, he must be encountered in the Bible! God is always speaking to us, but sometimes we can't hear him! All are welcome to this special liturgy as we hone our listening skills for God!
