## From the Pastor

We're back in what's called "Ordinary Time," meaning that the weeks are "ordinated" or numbered. Since we live in the Ogdoad or Eighth Day--the time between the Resurrection of Christ and his second coming—nothing can be ordinary in the usual meaning of that word.

This year we're reading from the gospel according to Luke and several themes will stand out. First, there is a geographical progression from Galilee to the climax in Jerusalem; second, there is a focus on what happens when the Spirit of God, the Holy Spirit, is at work; third, there is a message of God's predilection for those who have no one else to help them. This third theme is a constant challenge to us to have our faith expressed concretely in good works.

Now there may be a misunderstanding of this expression of "good works" as if it referred only to philanthropic activities. In reality, our good works must be directed first and foremost toward God himself. The Epistle of St. James is famous for its discussion of this very point. "You believe that God is one. You do well. Even the demons believe that and tremble."-- James 2:19. His point is that believing in God is salvific *if we also obey him*, which the demons of hell do not.

After that, the reality of our faith is expressed in concrete deeds toward our fellow human beings. Nowhere in the New Testament is it taught that charitable deeds can *substitute* for obedience to God. Holding up one's own good deeds as superior to doing what God wants of us can be a form of idolatry.

As usual, the Sacred Scriptures put it in a nutshell. The first and greatest of all the commandments is to love God with all our human powers, which is expressed by doing concretely what he asks of us. The second is like it: to love our neighbor through practical deeds.
