LAUD, O ZION!

In the thirteenth century, Pope Urban declared that a feast should be instituted to celebrate the mystery of the Blessed Sacrament. He commissioned Saint Thomas Aquinas to compose hymns for the feast we celebrate this weekend. Below are excerpts from the Sequence from the Corpus Christi liturgy, which beautifully sum up the Church's teaching on the Eucharist:

Lo! before our eyes and living / is the Sacred Bread life-giving, / theme of canticle and hymn. / We profess this Bread from heaven / to the Twelve by Christ was given, / for our faith rest firm in Him.

On this altar of the King / this new Paschal Offering / brings an end to ancient rite. / Shadows flee that truth may stay, / oldness to the new gives way, / and the night's darkness to the light.

What at Supper Christ completed / He ordained to be repeated, / in His memory Divine. / Wherefore now, with adoration, / we, the Host of our salvation, / consecrate from bread and wine.

Here beneath these signs are hidden / priceless things, to sense forbidden; / signs, not things, are all we see. / Flesh from bread, and Blood from wine, / yet is Christ in either sign, / all entire confessed to be.

Hail! Bread of the Angels, broken, / for us pilgrims food, and token / of the promise by Christ spoken, / children's meat, to dogs denied! / Shown in Isaac's dedication, / in the Manna's preparation, / in the Paschal immolation, / in old types presignified.

Small things ... little incidents ... solitary moments! As I write this final 'feature' for the Sunday Bulletin, they fill my mind and surges of emotion burst forth.

I think of the lights going off on Christmas Eve for 'Silent Night' ... the children almost knocking me over on the way to Liturgy of the Word at the 10.00 Mass ... the duets on the accordion with my colleagues at Appreciation Night ... the quiet ride to Matunuck on Sunday Morning ... being the 'starter' at our 5K Race ... the Red Sox/Yankee banter that never ends ... the altar-server saying 'Father, I liked your homily today'.

Its life's small moments that make the big ones all the more profound. After fourteen wonderful years at St. Francis of Assisi Parish, goodbye for me is large and intense. It also however creates in me a certain space to put all of my life in perspective. In this departure moment, I'm still discovering what vocation means, and I find myself being drawn to a greater reliance on and trust in the God of Love. In the face of the unknown, such is my peace.

I knew full well that investing myself in the life of this parish and its people would one day cost me the price of goodbyes and letting go. So, what to do? Hold back? Be tentative? No way! The longer we live, the more we see that life's hellos and goodbyes are nothing more than guideposts to the eternal hello. My consolation now is that this particular goodbye contains within it all the historical and rich meanings of the word. Goodbye is, after all, God-be-with-you! When people journey in faith together like we have, we become one, and for the rest of our lives we treasure that togetherness. In the goodbye then, God is present, holds us close, fills our emptiness, and gives us the freedom to move on.

A few years ago, in 'The Year of the Priest' proclaimed by Pope Benedict XVI, I spoke to you in a homily about my love for the priesthood, a life and lifestyle under the microscope because of the despicable actions of a small number. It's because of the example, holiness and inspiration of priests in the Diocese of Providence however, that I remain a happy priest 46 years later. They include that great friend to St. Francis of Assisi, the ageless Father Bob Randall, and those who served as assistants during my watch; Fathers Steve Amaral, Paul O'Rourke (RIP), Bob Caul, Jared Costanza, Tim Reilly, Gregory Stowe, and now the inimitable Joe Upton. A formidable, multi-talented and holy group of men! I am all the richer for having crossed their paths.

As I leave though, I really want you to know of my love for the Church which is *you*. Any fears and uncertainties I may have about the future are transmuted into hope because over the years I have seen in your faces the face of Christ. In you, the Good News that is gospel is real.

Thanks for taking me in! Thanks for being my life! Thanks most of all for giving it meaning and fulfillment. God-be-with-you!

IN SPIRIT AND TRUTH: THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of the Lord, a special feast set aside for reflecting on the mystery of the Eucharist. The Alternative



Year of Liturgical and Spiritual Renewal

Opening Prayer for today's Solemnity reads: "Lord Jesus Christ, we worship you living among us in the sacrament of your body and blood. May we offer to our Father in heaven a solemn pledge of undivided love. May we offer to our brothers and sisters a life poured out in loving service of that kingdom where you live with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen." This prayer encapsulates beautifully the teaching of the Church on the Eucharist. Firstly, the Eucharist is truly Jesus' presence among us. It is not symbolic, it is not a sign of something that it itself is not in reality. Catholics believe that the bread and wine, after the words of consecration are spoken by the priest, are truly the body and blood of Jesus. The reality of the Eucharist is attested to by Jesus himself in the Gospel of Saint John when he says explicitly: "My flesh is true food and my blood is true drink" (John 6:55). Why should the Eucharist truly be Jesus' body and blood? Wouldn't a spiritual union with him be sufficient? The scriptural notion of sacrifice requires the offering of an innocent victim which is then consumed by those offering the sacrifice. Think back to the first Passover. On the eve of their flight from Egypt, the Jews were instructed to procure a spotless lamb and offer it in sacrifice to God. They were then instructed to consume the sacrifice. By consuming the Eucharist, we attain an authentic union with the body and blood of Jesus, which leads to a deeper spiritual communion. Since the Eucharist is truly Jesus living among us, the Blessed Sacrament is adored through signs of devotion such as genuflections when passing before the tabernacle, bowing before receiving Holy Communion, and making visits to the Blessed Sacrament throughout the week. The prayer also makes it clear that worship of Jesus in the Eucharist should lead to a Eucharistic life of thanksgiving poured out in service to our brothers and sisters. Nourishment by Christ in the Eucharist nourishes us precisely for loving service to others. The liturgy captures this dynamic well by dismissing the congregation at the end of Mass, shortly after the reception of Holy Communion, and sending them forth into the world to live the Eucharist they have received.

FOODS/COMMODITIES FOR JUNE, JULY AND AUGUST ARE:


