THE MASS: YESTERDAY AND TODAY

The following account of the Mass was composed by Saint Justin, martyr, in the second century. It was addressed to the emperor in defense of the Christians. It gives us a precious glimpse into the worship of the early Church.

No one may share the Eucharist with us unless he believes that what we teach is true, unless he is washed in the regenerating waters of baptism for the remission of his sins, and unless he lives in accordance with the principles given us by Christ.

We do not consume the eucharistic bread and wine as if it were ordinary food and drink, for we have been taught that as Jesus Christ our Saviour became a man of flesh and blood by the power of the Word of God, so also the food that our flesh and blood assimilates for its nourishment becomes the flesh and blood of the incarnate Jesus by the power of his own words contained in the prayer of thanksgiving.

The apostles, in their recollections, which are called gospels, handed down to us what Jesus commanded them to do. They tell us that he took bread, gave thanks and said: Do this in memory of me. This is my body. In the same way he took the cup, he gave thanks and said: This is my blood. The Lord gave this command to them alone. Ever since then we have constantly reminded one another of these things. The rich among us help the poor and we are always united. For all that we receive we praise the Creator of the universe through his Son Jesus Christ and through the Holy Spirit.

On Sunday we have a common assembly of all our members, whether they live in the city or the outlying districts. The recollections of the apostles or the writings of the prophets are read, as long as there is time. When the reader has finished, the president of the assembly speaks to us; he urges everyone to imitate the examples of virtue we have heard in the readings. Then we all stand up together and pray.

On the conclusion of our prayer, bread and wine and water are brought forward. The president offers prayers and gives thanks to the best of his ability, and the people give assent by saying, "Amen". The eucharist is distributed, everyone present communicates, and the deacons take it to those who are absent.

We hold our common assembly on Sunday because it is the first day of the week, the day on which God put darkness and chaos to flight and created the world, and because on that same day our saviour Jesus Christ rose from the dead. For he was crucified on Friday and on Sunday he appeared to his apostles and disciples and taught them the things that we have passed on for your consideration.

IN SPIRIT AND TRUTH: THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

Today is traditionally called "Good Shepherd invites us to reflect on the image of a shepherd, the one who tends and looks after a flock in need of his direction and protection. One of the most

important tasks of the shepherd is to gather. Sheep have a tendency to wander. When left to their own devices, they go off, aimless and without direction. A shepherd must gather his sheep and keep them together, not only for their protection, but also for their nourishment. It is important to note that the liturgy itself retains these same functions of gathering, protecting, and nourishing. The liturgy gathers us into one body, a flock brought together principally to worship God. It's easy for us to wander, too, to allow ourselves to be swept up in the busy-ness of our daily lives. But in the liturgy, we are gathered together: from the many into the one. The liturgy also protects us, in the sense that it shelters us from false worship, a worship based more on our own thoughts and emotions, and allows us to enter into the worship of the Son. The liturgy is not just a communal expression of praise (although it is that); it carefully guards us from total subjectivity in worship. The liturgy lifts us up out of time and inserts us into Jesus' worship of the Father in heaven. In this sense, we are protected from false worship, and are enabled to worship in spirit and in truth. Lastly, the liturgy nourishes us. It feeds us abundantly at the table of God's Word and the table of the Eucharist. Like sheep who wander around looking for nourishment in all the wrong places, the liturgy draws us together to receive the only nourishment that will satisfy the deepest longings of our hearts. The liturgy, like a good shepherd, leads us to the Good Shepherd, Jesus, who spreads a banquet before us in the Mass, in anticipation of the heavenly banquet that will never end.

NEW TRANSLATION COUNTDOWN

28 weeks remain until the new translation of the Mass is implemented on November 27, 2011, the First Sunday of Advent.

TODAY IS THE WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS

Today is observed as a day of prayer for vocations to the priesthood and religious life. The theme for 2011 is: "Proposing Vocations in the Local Church," and emphasizes the need of each local parish community to encourage young men and women to consider accepting the challenge of a priestly or religious vocation. Our Holy Father in his message commemorating this special day observed: "The work of carefully encouraging and supporting vocations finds a radiant source of inspiration in those places in the Gospel where Jesus calls his disciples to follow him and trains them with love and care. We should pay close attention to the way that Jesus called his closest associates to proclaim the Kingdom of God (cf. Lk 10:9). In the first place, it is clear that the first thing he did was to pray for them: before calling them, Jesus spent the night alone in prayer, listening to the will of the Father (cf. Lk 6:12) in a spirit of interior detachment from mundane concerns. It is Jesus' intimate conversation with the Father which results in the calling of his disciples. Vocations to the ministerial priesthood and to the consecrated life are first and foremost the fruit of constant contact with the living God and insistent prayer lifted up to the "Lord of the harvest", whether in parish communities, in Christian families or in groups specifically devoted to prayer for vocations."
