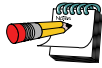

WHY DO WE NEED THE NEW MASS TRANSLATION?

Here's an example from last Sunday's liturgy. The opening prayer read: *"God of mercy, you wash away our sins in water, you give us new birth in the Spirit, and redeem us in the blood of Christ. As we celebrate Christ's resurrection increase our awareness of these blessings, and renew your gift of life within us."* Here is the new translation of that prayer which is much richer in tone: **"God of everlasting mercy, who in the very recurrence of the paschal feast kindle the faith of the people you have made your own, increase, we pray, the grace you have bestowed, that all may grasp and rightly understand in what font they have been washed, by whose Spirit they have been reborn, by whose Blood they have been redeemed."** The whole thrust of the prayer, properly translated, conveys a deeper sense of the Easter mystery. Imagine the entire liturgy being prayed in language that is accurate, poetic, and theologically rich! Why do we need the new translation? Because the words we use really matter!

NEW TRANSLATION PREVIEW: THE LORD BE WITH YOU

In the liturgy of the Roman Catholic Church, the greeting "The Lord be with you," is always given by an ordained minister (deacon, priest, or bishop). Each of these greetings expresses the desire that the power of the Spirit of God may be given to the People of God that they may enter into worship as one and be enabled to do what God has entrusted them to do. Each time we hear the words, "The Lord be with you," we should call to mind that we need the presence of God or the power of the Holy Spirit to be able to worship God fittingly, to hear what Sacred Scripture has to teach us, to offer our sacrifices and ourselves in union with Christ's one perfect sacrifice of Himself on the Cross to the Father, and to take the graces that we receive in the Mass into the world. **In the new translation of the Roman Missal, the use of which will begin on November 27, 2011, the response is rendered, "And with your spirit" instead of the familiar, "And also with you." Why the change?** "And with your spirit" is certainly not common street language, and apart from the fact that it is a more literal translation it also carries more theological significance than "And also with you." As opposed to a mere wish that the deacon, priest, or bishop might have the same good thing as wished upon the congregation, saying **"And with your spirit"** is the faithful's way of assuring the minister that the gift of the Spirit given to him at his ordination, through which he has just extended this gift to the People of God, is also assisting the deacon, priest, or bishop to fulfill those sacred duties entrusted to them.

IN SPIRIT AND TRUTH: THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

Today's gospel recounts the story of the disciples on the road to Emmaus. This powerful story provides a vision of worship that still characterizes our Mass to this day. Notice that the disciples, weighed down with their cares, concerns, burdens and anxieties, are met by the Risen Lord. At every Mass, we present ourselves, weighed down by the burden of our cares, concerns, sins and anxieties. We begin each Mass, after the greeting, with the Penitential Rite, recognizing our need for God's mercy and strength. In other words, Jesus meets the disciples "where they are." The same is true of us at Mass, we come to Jesus "as we are." Then the downcast disciples have their minds opened to the truth of God's Word in the Holy Scriptures. Jesus breaks open the Word for them and their hearts burn with joy. Likewise, at each Mass, we listen attentively at the table of God's Word. The part of the Mass known as the "Liturgy of the Word" exposes us to the Sacred Scriptures, and should cause our hearts to burn as we hear the story of God's raging love for his people. Then the disciples sit down to a meal with the Risen Jesus. It is in the breaking of the bread that they come to see him as the Lord. And then he vanishes! In our experience at Mass, after hearing God's Word proclaimed, we experience a meal. But the meal that we experience at Mass is unlike any other. This meal is also a *sacrifice*. We come to know Jesus in the breaking of the bread, the sacrament of the Eucharist, which makes present to us the sacrifice of Jesus on Calvary. We eat this sacrificial meal with reverence, knowing that it is actually the risen and glorified Body of Jesus that becomes our food and drink! Notice that once the disciples recognize Jesus, he vanishes! Why? Because Jesus' presence is now sacramental, it is hidden. Rather than make himself known to us in bodily form, Jesus becomes present to us under the appearance of bread and wine, ordinary signs that speak to us of nourishment and well-being. But we know, through faith, that these signs contain a hidden reality that is not perceived by human senses alone! Like the disciples on the road to Emmaus, we cannot see Jesus, but we know he's there. At every Mass, we should come to know him in the breaking of the bread, so that our hearts can burn within us!



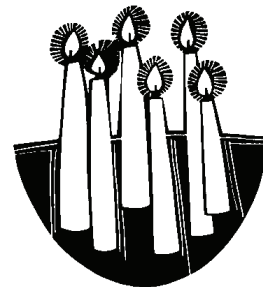
