FROM THE PASTOR...

Since arriving at St. Francis I have been very impressed by the number of parishioners who contribute so wholeheartedly to the pastoral ministry of our parish. One particularly outstanding area of service is in the pastoral care to the sick and homebound. In addition to the priests and deacon, we have quite a number of lay ministers of Holy Communion who assist in this ministry. Every day, seven days a week, someone from our parish brings Holy Communion to the Catholic patients at South County Hospital. Additionally, there are Communion services offered regularly at Brightview Manor, Scallop Shell Nursing Home and Peace Dale House. We also bring Holy Communion to a number of individuals who are homebound. Of course, both Father Joe and I each provide emergency coverage at South County Hospital one day a week and we offer Mass at both Scallop Shell and South Bay Manor once a month. I am grateful that, thanks to our caring parishioners who are so generous with their time, we can provide this outstanding service.

In this regard, if you or someone in your family is homebound due to age or illness, and can no longer join us for Mass at Church on a regular basis, please call to arrange for someone to visit and bring Holy Communion. It is important for us to reach out to these parishioners and let them know that they are still an important part of our faith community. In this spirit, our daily Mass community prays for the sick and the homebound every morning before Mass.

Also, if you or someone in your family is in the hospital, please give us a call so that we are aware. Given the fact that many hospital stays are very brief, the priests are not always able to make a personal visit, but we can certainly keep them in our prayers. Also, if someone has a serious illness or is expecting to undergo major surgery, we can arrange for them to receive the Sacrament of the Sick. This is an important sacrament of strength and healing that is not just intended for those who are on the brink of death. In fact, if someone is terminally ill or an elderly person is in clearly failing condition, please call for a priest to administer the sacrament as soon as possible rather than waiting until the very last minute. The sacrament can be a source of grace and comfort to a dying person.

On another subject, next weekend our second collection will be for the Archdiocese for the Military Services which provides sacraments and pastoral care worldwide for the 1.5 million Catholic members of the U.S. armed forces and their families. I served as a chaplain in the U.S. Air Force Reserves for over twenty years and I am personally aware of the great work of the archdiocese and how much our military men and women appreciate the pastoral ministry, especially when they are far from home. Bishop Tobin has authorized this one-time collection and encouraged our participation. You will find an informative brochure about the Archdiocese in today's parish bulletin. There is no particular envelope for this collection, but I hope you will respond generously. Msgr. Theroux

DIES IRAE, DIES ILLA!

On All Soul's Day, the Liturgy of the Hours (prayed daily by priests and religious) proscribes the recitation of the 13th century hymn "Dies Irae." Before the Second Vatican Council, this hymn, attributed to Thomas of Celano, was sung at every Funeral Mass and Mass for the Dead. The hymn, while severe in its presentation of the judgment, is also hopeful in Jesus' tender mercy toward sinners. Very rarely now does one have an opportunity to hear the chant and reflect on its meaning, although settings of the hymn were once popularized by great composers like Mozart and Verdi. Wednesday, November 2, the traditional chant will be sung immediately before our 7PM Mass of Remembrance. The English text will be provided. The age-old hymn is a true lesson in sin, death, judgment and eternal life. It is an element of our rich liturgical and spiritual patrimony!

WELCOMING THE NEW TRANSLATION OF THE MASS

A Six-Part Series

Part Six: The Eucharistic Prayer and Communion Rite

For the past several weeks, we have been discussing upcoming changes to the prayers of the Mass. As you know, in a few weeks, every English-speaking parish in the world will implement a more accurate



translation of the Latin texts of the Mass. This week we reflect on changes to the institution narrative of the Eucharistic prayer and the "Lord, I am not worthy" prayer before receiving Communion.

The central point of the Mass is the Eucharistic prayer. After the Scriptures have been proclaimed and expounded, according to our Savior's command, the sacrifice of the Cross is re-presented as Christ, Himself, is made substantially present on the altar. The bread and wine through the invocation of the Holy Spirit and words of the priest become really and truly the Body and Blood of our Lord.

In the current translation the priest prays "This is the cup of my blood...shed for you and for all." In the new translation, the priest will now say, "This is the chalice of my blood... poured out for you and for many." Chalice as opposed to cup more clearly expresses the fact that this is no ordinary cup, but instead the chalice of our salvation containing the precious blood of Jesus.

The use of the phrase "for many" could be misleading. It is true that God's goodness extends to all and Jesus died for the sins of all mankind. "For many" however is a more accurate translation of the Latin *pro multis* and more accurately reflects the Scriptures (Mt. 26:28). It also makes clear that we must accept God's offer of mercy, be joined to his sacrifice through the Sacrament of Baptism and made partners in the life of God. All are not saved simply by Jesus' sacrifice but must be joined to it through faith and the Sacraments.

Finally, before receiving Communion we will now say, "Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof." This—more faithful to the Latin—makes clear the connection to the Roman centurion (Matthew 8:8). It is an allusion to this man of faith, acknowledging his unworthiness for the Lord to enter where he lives. The lesson here is that prayer—and certainly the Liturgy—ought to be based on the words of Scripture. The words of Scripture have priority in liturgical texts, in music, and in our prayer.

The new translation of the Roman missal is just a few weeks away. While change is never easy, this new translation should be embraced and welcomed as an opportunity to grow in our love of the Sacred Liturgy.
