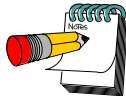

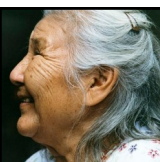

## *From the Pastor*

One of the things that added to the merriment of the "Merry Christmas" season for me was seeing the 6 or 7 different spellings of my name on the Christmas cards that many of you so kindly sent. My family name is not unknown in central and western Massachusetts, but here in RI it's almost unheard of. My father's paternal grandfather was born the child of Norbert and Amelie (Hebert) Beaudin in northern New York State and christened Narcisse. When the family moved to Massachusetts, he became Nelson Bodah. Go figure. He married an Irishwoman, Mary Kitterick, whose name had been changed to Kittredge when she came through immigration. Nelson and Mary had only one child, Henry David, who was my grandfather and who also married a woman from Ireland, Anne Marie O'Malley, who had been baptized Anna Mariah and whose last name was usually given as Melia back home in Co. Mayo.

My mother's people came from several regions in Northern Italy. Her name was Norma Maria Ozzella but the name came from Piedmont and was probably Uccello (Bird) in standard Italian. Whatever it was originally, when they came to the States it seems to have become Ozello, then Ozella before it ended up with the spelling my grandfather used. His mother was also from Piedmont and had been Pugnio before she married my great-grandfather. My mother's maternal grandfather was a Beltrame from the region of Friuli and her maternal grandmother was a Giacomuzzi from around Trent, which was still part of the Austrian Empire when she left there. All my grandparents were born in the US, except for my father's mother.

In any case, I wish they had left the family name alone. Even though the spelling Beaudin would have made everyone assume that I was French-Canadian, it would probably have made things simpler.

## St. Francis de Sales

Feastday is next Saturday, January 24th  
Patron Saint of Journalists, Writers

Born in France in 1567, Francis was a patient man. He knew for thirteen years that he had a vocation to the priesthood before he mentioned it to his family. When his father said that he wanted Francis to be a soldier and sent him to Paris to study, Francis said nothing. Then when he went to Padua to get a doctorate in law, he still kept quiet, but he studied theology and practiced mental prayer while getting into swordfights and going to parties. Even when his bishop told him if he wanted to be a priest that he thought that he would have a miter waiting for him someday, Francis uttered not a word. Why did Francis wait so long? Throughout his life he waited for God's will to be clear. He never wanted to push his wishes on God, to the point where most of us would have been afraid that God would give up!

God finally made His will clear to Francis while he was riding. Francis fell from his horse three times. Every time he fell the sword came out of the scabbard. Every time it came out the sword and scabbard came to rest on the ground in the shape of the cross. And then, Francis, without knowing about it, was appointed provost of his diocese, second in rank to the bishop.

For Francis, the love of God was like romantic love. He said, *"The thoughts of those moved by natural human love are almost completely fastened on the beloved, their hearts are filled with passion for it, and their mouths full of its praises. When it is gone they express their feelings in letters, and can't pass by a tree without carving the name of their beloved in its bark. Thus too those who love God can never stop thinking about him, longing for him, aspiring to him, and speaking about him. If they could, they would engrave the name of Jesus on the hearts of all humankind."*

The key to love of God was prayer. *"By turning your eyes on God in meditation, your whole soul will be filled with God. Begin all your prayers in the presence of God."*

From one of St. Francis de Sales' writings, **INTRODUCTION TO THE DEVOUT LIFE:**

*During the course of the day, recall as often as possible that you are in God's presence. Consider what God does and what you are doing. You will see His eyes turned toward you and constantly fixed on you with incomparable love. Then you will say to Him, "O God, why do I not look always at You, just as You always look at me? Why do You think so often of me, O Lord, and why do I think so seldom of You?" Where are we, O my soul? God is our true place, and where are we? (INT. Part II, Ch. 12; O. III, p. 92)*
